




Prospectus

He was responsible for the revival of the Indian educational system by bringing together pupils from different strata of society in one classroom. A great philospher and a political thinker, he was most famous as the founder of the Arya Samaj.


Swami Dayanand was born on February 12, 1824 in Tankara in the western Indian state of Gujrat. At a time when Hinduism was divided between the various schools of philosophy and theology, Swami Dayanand went straight back to the Vedas as he considered them the most authoritative repository of knowledge and truth spoken in the "Words of God". After his demise in 1883, a group of socially oriented people decided to raise a memorial which should be a befitting tribute to his great ideals. They formed by Dayanand Anglo Vedic (DAV) College Trust and Management Society which was registered in 1885.






This was the beginning of the great movement which is now popularly known as the D.A.V. movement. The society established its first institution D.A.V. School, at Lahore on June 1, 1886, with Lala Hans Raj (Later Mahatma Hans Raj) as its homorary Headmaster. The main objective of the D.A.V. institutions it to impart such education to the children as, while it helps to imbibe in them a sense of deep patriotism and pride in their ancient culture and civilization, instills in them a disciplined outlook deeply dedicated to the pursuit of knowledge. These institutions aim at creating environment truly conducive to the development of the child mentally, physically and spiritually.

The D.A.V. College Trust and Management Society is already more than a hundred years old. This is now the biggest non-government educational organization in India. It covers broadly the entire spectrum of educational activity in the country. Scheme of Examination, Evaluation And Promotion

- 1. For Grade III & IV the entire academic year is categorized by four unit exams.
 - (a) Please note final and half yearly examination is NOT to be conducted in Grade-III and IV.
 - (b) Each unit test for each subject will be for 20 marks only.
- 2. 20 marks are allocated for internal assessment. The weight age of internal assessment is further divide as given below:--
 - (a) 5 marks for timely and regular submission of class work and homework assignments.
 - (b) 5 marks for subject enrichment such as multiplication table in mathematics, reading /recitation with proper intonation in language etc.
 - (c) 5 marks for activities/projects.
 - (d) 2 marks for neatness and proper maintenance of notebooks/project reports etc.
 - (e) 3 marks for attitude towards subject.
- 3. (a) In grade V the entire academic year will have four unit exam and final examination at the end of the year
 - (b) . Each unit test for each subject will be for 20 marks only.
 - (c). The final exam for each subject will have a weight age of 50 marks.
- 4. 20 marks are allotted for internal assessment based or same criteria as mentioned for Grade-III & IV.
- 5. The final result of Grade –V will be prepared as follows:
 - 30 % of all unit +20% internal assessment +50% final exam i.e. (30+20+50=100)

Eligibility To Appear In Examinations

- · To be eligible to appear in the annual examination a student must ensure 75% attendance of the total lessons delivered in each subject.
- · A student must ensure satisfactory behavior in & outside the classroom throughout his/her stay in the school.
- · A student must ensure regular home work to the entire satisfaction of the subject teacher.
- · A student who fails to score at least the minimum qualifying marks laid down by the school, will not be eligible to appear in the examination.
- · A clearance certificate from the school clearly stating that he has paid all school dues.

Registration and Admission

- · The School academic year is from April to March. Admission is given on the basis of merit and availability of seats.
- The School has the right to offer admission in the class for which the child is found fit. Admission through an entrance test and interview shall be taken of candidates seeking admission on filing in theRegistration / Admission forms available in the school office along with school prospectus on payment of prescribed fee from IX onwards.
- · Registration does not (in any way) guarantees admission.
- · The school reserves the right to accept or reject any application for admission without assigning any reason.
- · Registration and admission to classes Nursery onwards starts in January.
- · No student is admitted in class X and XII except transfer cases as per CBSE norms.

Admission Criteria

- · The Registration / Admission form must be filled is every respect and submitted in the school office, which will give a date for the admission.
- · Parents/Guardians must note that the candidate's past record will be the main criteria to judge his/her eligibility for admission.
- · The new entrants will have to submit their Transfer Certificate (T.C.) issued by the recognized school last attended.
- · Name and date of birth of the child as recorded in the Birth Certificate in case of Nursery, LKG and UKG and as recorded in the Transfer Certificate of the pervious school in all other cases should be filled is the admission form and that will be final.
- No request for change of name and date of birth of the child and names of father and mother will be entertained later. Admission of a child to the school will mean complete acceptance by the guardian/parents of all school rules in force or amended from time to time.
- · School rules are subject to periodical review and amendment.

Arya Samaj


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1. God is the primary cause of all true knowledge and of every thing known by its means.

- 10. One should subordinate oneself for the common welfare of the society while one is free to act for his/her own welfare.


